- Gluck, Christoph Willibald (composer), Ranieri de' Calzabigi (librettist), and Gasparo Angiolini (choreographer). *Don Juan.* 1761. Premiered at the Theater am Kärntnertor in Vienna, Austria in 1761.
- 3. Strauss, Richard (composer). Don Juan. 1888. Premiered in Weimar, Germany in 1889.

³ Da Ponte's libretto for *Don Giovanni* was heavily drawn from Bertati's libretto for *Don Giovanni Tenorio*.
